Gifted Children You can detect gifted children if you know the characteristics and symptoms they show normally, whether they are 3, 5 years. The best way to recognize gifted children is through observation by teachers and, above all, parents. They should be alert to any sign that seems unusual. If we fail to identify gifted children we can run two risks: First, make the child feel socially maladaptive because they feel different from other children and do not understand why. For example, Java is an 8 year old boy who enjoys reading about the universe in his spare time.
